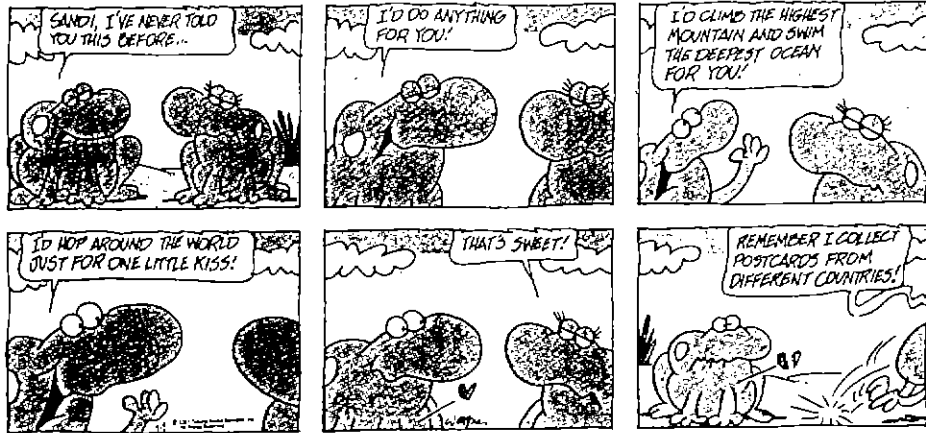

**SPEED READING (Item Numbers 61-67)**

**NEW GUINEA**—Good news for residents of Papua: The island isn't sinking after all. Last year, scientists believed that the island was slipping into the Pacific so fast that they asked government officials to begin planning the relocation of 20,000 residents. It now seems that the flooding that caused the concern was the result of a temporary rise in sea level that occurs in La Niña years.

**NEW YORK**—An earthquake struck New York City around sunrise on Jan. 17. While it measured only 2.4 on the Richter scale and lasted just a few seconds, the quake—rare in the Big Apple—sent residents running into the streets. The last measurable quake, a 4.0, hit in 1985.

**ANTARCTICA**—The West Antarctica Ice Sheet is melting faster than many researchers initially predicted. Researchers in Britain say nearly a cubic mile of ice has melted annually for eight years. At this rate, it will take several centuries for the sheet to melt, eventually raising sea levels by 45 ft.

**INDIA**—The death toll is expected to reach 30,000 and possibly as high as 100,000

following a massive earthquake that struck the western state of Gujarat on Jan. 26. Aid officials say most of the deaths were due to poorly engineered buildings, which collapsed in the first moments of the magnitude 7.9 quake.

**ALGERIA**—An inactive volcano in Ras Aichet, 300 miles southeast of Algiers, briefly came to life on Jan. 17, throwing boulders into the sky.

**NEW ZEALAND**—The country's Rotorua region, on the North Island, was struck by a series of 20 small earthquakes in mid-January. A more powerful 3.2 tremor rocked Manawatu.

**AUSTRALIA**—Hail the size of softballs pelted the city of Casino in late January, downing power lines and sending six residents to the hospital.

**PHILIPPINES**—Flash floods swept the Balugo River and its tributaries. Three people drowned and another 12,000 were forced to flee 10 towns located 300 miles south of Manila.

*Nearest Star* by Leon Golub and Jay Pasachoff. \$29.95, Harvard, ISBN 0674004671

The subtitle of *Nearest Star* is *The surprising science of our Sun*. And it is surprising: our knowledge of this normal dwarf star that happens to be all-important to life on Earth is very far from complete. Many puzzles remain, even if we know far more now than we did a few years ago, before data from spacecraft became available. In any case, Leon Golub and Jay Pasachoff are splendid guides to the subject, as both are highly distinguished American astronomers who have paid special attention to the Sun.

*Nearest Star* is a **comprehensive** survey, dealing with all aspects of solar research. It is well written and well illustrated, and there is a good glossary and a useful bibliography. It is probably not a book for the complete beginner, or for the amateur observer using **modest** equipment; **it is not intended to be so**. If, however, you are looking for a reliable, up-to-date and very readable account of modern solar science, with special emphasis on Earth-Sun relationships, then **this** is the one for you.

It is doubtful that A.A. Milne had read the Transcendental writings of Henry David Thoreau when he wrote and published *Winnie-the-Pooh*. Thoreau, like Pooh, lived alone in the woods with friends near to **him** but not overwhelmingly close. Thoreau lived **frugally**: eating what he

5 gained by his own hand, building his own shelter, and walking about in nature studying the patterns of life and gaining insight. Pooh also simply lives by simple means and simple rules, but Pooh is complex and often misunderstood. His naïve, simplistic life is not one easily achieved nor easily enjoyed by just any inhabitant of the Hundred Acre Wood. Pooh’s

10 life is without the worry of planting a garden and gaining materialistic success (Rabbit), the endless pursuit of useless knowledge to confuse





everyone else (Owl), the constant pessimism and depression that comes from too much interaction with unimportant worldly matters (Eeyore), and the nervous insecurity that is a result of an unsure character without a grasp on his true self (Piglet). Pooh is in fact a Transcendentalist, and a perfect model for children and adults who want a happy, peaceful life in harmony with both themselves and nature, free of strife and materialistic worries.
